TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING
May 7, 2020**

The Committee Meeting of the Pennsauken Township Committee was held via ZOOM video conference due to the pandemic in effect.

The Meeting was called to order by Mayor Tim Killion at 6:02 pm.

PRESENT: Committeeman Dyer, Committeewoman McBride, Committeewoman Rafeh, Deputy Mayor DiBattista and Mayor Killion

Also present were Township Administrator Joseph Palumbo, Acting Township Clerk Pamela Scott-Forman, Deputy Clerk Ana Matos and Linda Galella, Esq.

Mayor Killion gave an update on the numbers of the pandemic which has affected our community stating Pennsauken has 340 cases and unfortunately seven deaths. The Mayor then called for the Salute to the Flag to be followed by a Moment of Silence.

Mayor Killion announced the meeting was in compliance of the "Senator Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings Act".

ORDINANCE NO. 2020:05

ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PENNSAUKEN, COUNTY OF CAMDEN, NEW JERSEY, GUARANTEEING PAYMENT OF CERTAIN PROJECT NOTES AND REVENUE BONDS TO BE ISSUED BY THE MERCHANTVILLE-PENNSAUKEN WATER COMMISSION

BACKGROUND

WHEREAS, The Merchantville-Pennsauken Water Commission ("Commission"), a body politic of the State of New Jersey, situated at 6751 Westfield Avenue, Pennsauken, New Jersey 08110, has been duly organized in accordance with the

provisions of *N.J.S.A. 40:62-108 et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, the Commission is jointly owned by the Borough of Merchantville, County of Camden, New Jersey and the Township of Pennsauken, County of Camden, New Jersey ("Township") in the following percentages:

Borough of Merchantville	11.58%
Township of Pennsauken	<u>88.42</u>
	<u>100.00%</u>

WHEREAS, the Commission has determined there exists a need within its service area for various improvements to its water system ("Water System") consisting of the construction of a Perfluorononanoic acid treatment plant to be located at Woodbine Avenue in Merchantville, New Jersey, all as more particularly described in the information prepared in connection therewith by the Commission's Consulting Engineer, on file and available for inspection in the offices of the Commission (collectively, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Commission has determined to finance the costs of the Project through the issuance of its water revenue bonds in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,500,000 (collectively, the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, the Commission has also determined to temporarily finance the costs of the Project through the issuance of its Project Notes, Series 2020, in the principal amount of up to \$2,500,000 ("Notes"; together with other project notes issued to refinance the Notes in subsequent years and the Bonds, the "Obligations"); and

WHEREAS, the Notes will be authorized by the Commission pursuant to a resolution of the Commission entitled, "RESOLUTION OF THE MERCHANTVILLE-PENNSAUKEN WATER COMMISSION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF ITS PROJECT NOTES, SERIES 2020, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF UP TO \$2,500,000; DELEGATING TO CERTAIN COMMISSION OFFICIALS THE POWER TO MAKE CERTAIN DETERMINATIONS AND TO AWARD AND SELL THE NOTES; APPROVING CERTAIN TERMS AND PROVISIONS OF THE NOTES AND THE PLEDGE OF REVENUES TO SECURE THE PAYMENT OF THE NOTES; AND DETERMINING CERTAIN MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH"; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Township to guarantee repayment of said Obligations in the event of a default by the Commission.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PENNSAUKEN, COUNTY OF CAMDEN, NEW JERSEY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Township hereby guarantees repayment of the principal of and interest on the Obligations, when due, in the event the Commission is unable to make such payment.

Section 2. Said unconditional guarantee by the Township shall be to the full extent of its ownership interest in the Commission, that being 88.42% of the amount of any default by the Commission.

Section 3. The term of this guaranty ordinance shall extend until the Obligations have been paid in full.

Section 4. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent or in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of any such inconsistency.

Section 6. In accordance with the Local Bond Law, Chapter 169 of the Laws of 1960 of the State of New Jersey, as amended and supplemented, this guaranty ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

Administrator Palumbo explained this is a guarantee of payment of the capital bond

No public wished to comment

ORDINANCE NO. 2020:06

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE APPROVAL AND PAYMENT OF CLAIMS BETWEEN MEETINGS OF THE GOVERNING BODY

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:5-17 authorizes the governing body of a municipality to permit, by Ordinance, the approval or disapproval, and payment or non-payment, of claims, bills, invoices, and purchase orders between meetings of the governing body; and

WHEREAS, given the State of Emergency recently announced by the Governor of the State of New Jersey on March 9, 2020, Executive Order 103, and on March 16, 2020 Executive Order 104, resulting from the Coronavirus/COVID-19 virus, as well as guidance developing daily from the New Jersey Department of Health and the U.S. Center for Disease Control, and the possibility that meetings of the governing body may have to be cancelled, rescheduled, or otherwise suspended, such that bills which are normally paid by the governing body every four (4) weeks, may be unable to be approved by the governing body, but still need to be paid; and

WHEREAS, the procedures for “Claims Approval” set forth in Chapter 20 of the Code of the Township of Pennsauken may become unavailable, infeasible or temporarily incapable of compliance, and exceptions from same need to be created; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:5-17(a) & (b) establish a procedure for the payment of such claims in between meetings of the governing body, and the governing body wishes to prepare for

the possibility that a situation may arise where it is unable to meet in a timely fashion to approve said payments.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken, County of Camden, State of New Jersey, the following:

SECTION 1. Emergency Procedures Authorized. The Township Committee hereby designates the Township's Chief Financial Officer as the "Approval Officer" within the meaning of N.J.S.A. 40A:5-17(a)(1) who shall be authorized, after consultation with the Township Administrator (and in the absence of the Administrator, the Mayor, and Committee Member Liaison to the appropriate department), to approve payments of claims that would normally be considered by the Township Committee, at its regular meetings, and which must be paid in order to comply with State law and/or contractual requirements with the vendor, and which otherwise would not be able to await a meeting of the governing body, subject, nevertheless, to sufficient appropriations being available for the payments to be made; and subject further to a determination by the Approval Officer that there is legal authority for the payments, which shall be evidenced by the action of the appropriate Department or Purchasing Agent or Officer in respect to the goods or services so ordered having authorized same, and the incurring of the expense having already occurred therefore.

SECTION II. Prior to making payment on such claims, the Approval Officer shall receive the same certification as the Township Committee would receive before authorizing payment, under N.J.S.A. 40A:5-16(b), that the claims were properly incurred and should be paid.

SECTION III. Following payment of the claims, the Approval Officer shall certify same to the governing body, by providing the same list the governing body would have received had it approved said payments, which certification and list(s) shall be provided to the Township Committee for its review at the next meeting, and which shall be entered into the minutes of said meeting as having been paid.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Approval Officer shall not make payment upon any claim in excess of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00), without having first secured verbal approval of at least a quorum of the governing body to pay said bill. This exception shall not apply to the payment of invoices for goods and/or services where the governing body has previously authorized that particular expenditure, nor to the payment of taxes due to the School Districts, and County; nor to the payment of insurance premiums and

debt payments.

ARTICLE III. Repealer, Severability and Effective Date.

- A. Repealer. Any and all Ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of any such inconsistencies.
- B. Severability. In the event that any clause, section, paragraph or sentence of this Ordinance is deemed to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, then the Township Committee hereby declares its intent that the balance of the Ordinance not affected by said invalidity shall remain in full force and effect to the extent that it allows the Township to meet the goals of the Ordinance.
- C. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon proper passage in accordance with the law.

Administrator Palumbo commented this allows the Township to continue to pay bill during the pandemic.

WHEREAS, an emergent condition has arisen with respect to the amount of appropriations authorized in the temporary budget and no adequate provision has been made in the 2020 temporary appropriations for the aforesaid purpose, and N.J.S. 40A:4-20 provides for the creation of an emergency temporary appropriation for the purpose above mentioned; and

WHEREAS, the total emergency temporary resolutions adopted in the year 2020 pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 96, P.L. 1951 (N.J.S. 40A:4-20) including this resolution total \$12,841,555.62.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, (not less than two-thirds of all the members thereof affirmatively concurring) that in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S. 40A:4-20:

- 1. Effective April 30, 2020, an emergency temporary appropriation be and the same is hereby made for the 2020 temporary budget in the amount of \$19,518,773.74.

RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE GRACE PERIOD FOR PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS PER EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 130

BE IT RESOLVED Township Committee recognizes the unprecedented and challenging circumstances we are all facing and recognize and fully support Executive Order No. 130, signed by Governor Murphy on April 28, 2020, which allows municipalities to extend the 2020 2nd Quarter grace period for property tax payments

due on May 1st. Such an extension would provide much-needed relief to homeowners struggling financially as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED Under existing law, towns may only allow for a grace period of up to 10 days after the property tax deadline without interest or penalty. In the aftermath of Superstorm Sandy, the law was amended to allow towns that have experienced a flood, hurricane, superstorm, tornado or other natural disaster to extend the grace period for up to a month in certain circumstances. There is currently no mechanism in the law to allow municipalities to extend the grace period as a result of a public health-related emergency. Executive Order No. 130 allows towns to extend the grace period for property tax payments due on May 1st to June 1st, which will enable homeowners to pay their taxes a month after they are due without incurring any interest costs or penalties.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we are amending Resolution No. 2020:66 that there is accorded the taxpayer a thirty (30) day grace period for the 2nd quarter 2020 tax payment, after which payment of said 2nd Quarter taxes become delinquent and the interest payable there under as fixed by resolution 2020:66 shall be calculated from the date the municipal claims first became due.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken, in the County of Camden and State of New Jersey, hereby extends the interest free grace period for 2nd Quarter 2020 property tax grace period from May 10, 2020 to June 1, 2020 relevant to Resolution 2020:66 passed on January 3, 2020 at reorganization.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Township Clerk is hereby directed to send a certified copy of this resolution to the Tax Collector, Tax Assessor and the Chief Financial Officer.

Administrator Palumbo replied this resolution formalizes the Governor’s executive order #130 for the grace period for tax collection

Nancy Delgado of Laurel Avenue questioned what happens if the pandemic is still in effect after June 1st if the Township would extend the grace period again

Mayor Killion commented he is not sure what the Governor’s office will do.

Attorney Galella stated it’s “wait and see” at this time, and that the Township has to follow the State regulations.

The Mayor opened the floor to the public for comment

Ellyn McMullen of Palace Court questioned the status of the budget

Administrator Palumbo responded the budget was worked on in late March, early April with the unknown impact of the pandemic. He stated the budget is ready for first reading at the May 21st meeting.

Nancy Delgado of Laurel Avenue commented the parking lot of the Save-A-LOT on Federal Street is becoming a parking lot of semi truck's and feels it's a safety concern.

Committeeman Dyer also thanked the 1st responders and expressed his deepest condolences. He reiterated the need to continue to practice social distancing and wearing their mask when out and about. He also commented for everyone to be vigilant when the weather breaks.

Mayor Killion commented the CENSUS forms still need to be completed and asked everyone to tell a friend and complete the form. He stated the 49th street Park is underway and if you ride by you can see the progress, which is exciting to see. He encouraged everyone to visit the Township social media outlets for updates commenting they are updated daily. Finally he asked the residents for patience and reminded them not to let their guards down, follow the ruled and practice social distancing even in the parks. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A CLOSED SESSION OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PENNSAUKEN TO DISCUSS MATTERS OF ATTORNEY CLIENT PRIVLIDGE – CONTRACTS & PERSONNEL

WHEREAS, the Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken is subject to the requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-6- et. seq; and

WHEREAS, the Open Public Meetings Act of the State of New Jersey generally requires that all meetings of public bodies be open to the public; and

WHEREAS, the Open Public Meetings Act further provides that a public body may exclude the public from a portion of a meeting at which the public body discusses items enumerated in the Open Public Meetings Act at N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b, which items are recognized as requiring confidentiality; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and appropriate for the Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken to discuss certain matters in a meeting not open to the public consistent with N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b.

WHEREAS, matters under discussion will not be disclosed until the need for confidentiality no longer exists; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken, pursuant to the Open Public Meetings Act of the State of New Jersey that:

1. The Township Committee of the Township of Pennsauken shall hold a closed meeting from which the public shall be excluded, on May 7, 2020.
2. The general nature of the subjects to be discussed at said closed meeting shall be matters of pending/anticipated litigation and contract negotiation, Attorney Client Privilege N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b (7)
3. The general nature of the subjects to be discussed at said closed meeting shall be matters of contract negotiation, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b (7)
